## Welcome to the 2019 FORS review

Safer, smarter and greener was the theme from the 2019 FORS Members' Conference, so we thought it would be fitting to write the 2019 review around those three important aspects of fleet operations.

With version 5 of the FORS Standard going live on 14 January 2019, it's been a busy year delivering training and providing support for new and existing members undertaking the version 5 audit. Now, more and more of you are making the progression from Bronze, to Silver and on to Gold. A staggering 126,144 people have completed the FORS Security and Counter Terrorism eLearning module. In 2019, 52,823 LoCITY eLearning and 6,358 LoCITY classroom courses have been completed, reinforcing the scheme's commitment to the environment.

In 2019, 5,031 Bronze audits were conducted and the overall pass rate for the year was a very creditable 73 per cent. This compares to 71 per cent last year. The 'unified audit' was introduced, meaning if you choose, you can have a unique Bronze, Silver and Gold accreditation date and there is a combined Silver and Gold upload for Gold applicants.

As well as the annual conference, the FORS regional briefings have become a regular feature in the programme of events. This year we held 14 briefings across eight locations throughout the UK. We greatly appreciate the engagement and feedback we get from these events.

Enjoy reading about the great work FORS members do and the standards they are achieving. FORS is a truly remarkable initiative and FORS members are remarkable operators – safer, smarter and greener.



With an increasing number of organisations specifying FORS in their supply chains, in 2019 we surveyed our members to find out how many of you were working on contracts which specify FORS. You told us of nearly 200 different organisations that are currently specifying FORS in their procurement contracts.

Around 100 of these are already signed up as FORS Champions. We actively work with these Champions to understand how they are specifying FORS and to ensure that they understand the most appropriate level of accreditation to apply to their supply chain.



In 2019 we held several specifier engagement events across the country to update existing and potential specifiers on the benefits of specifying FORS and to demonstrate the support that is available to them.

A new support tool introduced in 2019 is the Specifier Toolkit. Available on FORS Online, the toolkit pinpoints all the guidance documents and support material needed to help companies to specify FORS, including a series of contractual clause options that FORS has developed. FORS has also developed the FORS Overseer Dashboard to enable specifiers to monitor the FORS accreditation status of their supply chain. This dashboard has been designed for organisations that oversee a FORS supply chain or local region, as well as those who manage several FORS accredited operating centres. The dashboard makes it easier to look up and monitor FORS accredited organisations.

For organisations with very large supply chains, we've created a 'Who's on Board' Application Programming Interface (API). This API will allow a connection between the FORS database and the Specifiers IT system. This allows their supply chain to have their FORS accreditation status checked automatically against the FORS database and alerts them of any noncompliance.

In the last few months of 2019 we have also assisted specifiers in finding suitable accredited FORS operators by advertising opportunities directly to our Silver and Gold members. Look out for more of this in 2020.

#### Double Award-Winning Security and Counter Terrorism eLearning

Throughout 2019, the FORS Professional Security and Counter Terrorism eLearning module and toolkit have been helping to improve vehicle and personal safety and to reduce the threat of terrorism. Both the eLearning module and toolkit are designed to help increase awareness of the threats posed by terrorist incidents.



The Security and Counter Terrorism eLearning module was developed in partnership with the Metropolitan Police, the Department for Transport, High Speed 2 and the Driver and Vehicle Standards Agency (DVSA).





Since its launch, more than 126,000 individuals have benefitted from the eLearning and 2,611 have used the toolkit. The Security and Counter Terrorism eLearning gained national recognition in 2019 and is an award-winning eLearning course, having been named Counter Terrorism Education Project of the Year at the Counter Terrorism Awards 2019 and awarded Silver in the Best Public Service Programme category at the Training Journal Awards.

The judges of the Counter Terrorism Awards 2019 praised the eLearning module for its role in raising awareness of security and terrorist threats, specifically in terms of theft of vehicles or loads and the use of vehicles as weapons.

#### New FORS eLearning – making the streets safer for pedestrians

In 2018, across Great Britain, there were over 22.000 pedestrians involved in an incident with a vehicle. To raise awareness of the issue, FORS has developed a new eLearning module called Pedestrian Safe.

Through the 20-minute eLearning module, operators get to understand that all pedestrians are vulnerable, and the associated risks faced by different types of pedestrian. Pedestrian Safe helps operators to learn what actions they can take to keep pedestrians safe.

The module teaches drivers to avoid making incorrect assumptions around pedestrian behaviour, how to check driving conditions, leaving appropriate time before setting off and how to keep their focus whilst driving. Whilst the training is aimed at drivers, managers are also encouraged to complete the training.

Pedestrian Safe is the first FORS eLearning module to be developed as 'Mobile First' which means that it will be easier for drivers to complete the



module on a mobile device. However, the eLearning module is also compatible and easy to use on a computer as normal.



#### Spotlight on...

#### **Auditing and Compliance**

The FORS audit toolkit is designed to help operators prepare for their Bronze audit. In 2019, the first time pass rate for initial Bronze audits was a very creditable 73 per cent, a reflection that the FORS Standard is accessible but not just a 'tick box' exercise.

Seventy four qualified FORS auditors were active across the UK and Europe during 2019 and delivered a staggering 5.031 audits. 2019 saw the introduction of a second audit body, DriveTech, to undertake FORS Bronze audits alongside the existing audit provider, Fleet Source.

Furthermore, under the FORS Internal Audit Fleet Accreditation (IAFA) process there were an additional 69 auditors working within their own companies to deliver FORS audits as part of those

#### FORS Membership in 2019

By the end of 2019 there were 5,005 accredited members, and the number of companies progressing to Silver increased significantly by 17 per cent.

Seventy one per cent of the respondents to the 2019 Member Satisfaction Survey said they intend to maintain their accreditation longer than 12 months, representing a six per cent increase on last year's findings. Of these members, 57 per cent said they intend to maintain their accreditation for at least the next five years.

In 2019 we held membership and audit fees at 2015 prices and 80 per cent of survey respondents said that the fees were acceptable or good value.



organisations' internal quality assurance programmes.

Of course, operators must uphold the requirements at all times, and meeting the requirements of FORS at the time of the audit is only part of the story. Across the year the FORS compliance team investigated 607 cases of possible noncompliance received from a wide range of sources.

The vast majority were easily resolved, but where the complaints were upheld, seven organisations had their FORS accreditation terminated and 41 were suspended. Of the companies suspended, seven were reinstated following a satisfactory response or through undertaking one or more enhanced audits.





Through its growing FORS Professional training portfolio, FORS continues to offer a range of driver and manager online eLearning and classroom courses to support professional development.



Professional development is at the heart of the FORS Standard, and version 5 saw the introduction of mandatory security and counter terrorism training at Bronze, as well as more environmental training at Silver and Gold. This additional training addresses growing concerns over security and air quality respectively. With 97,355 drivers trained through FORS in 2019 in security and counter terrorism awareness and 60,465 drivers trained on FORS environmental training courses, FORS members are already making a real difference.

In total in 2019, over 600 people gualified as FORS Practitioners, and over 352,622 drivers and managers undertook our eLearning modules. We firmly believe that a smarter workforce translates into safer and greener operators.

Training remained a core FORS benefit in 2019 - either fully funded, meaning no charge, or discounted, meaning a small charge to members.

Discounted training was introduced in 2019 on Collision Management, Fleet Management Essentials and a number of additional FORS Practitioner workshops to complement the fully-funded programme of manager and driver training.

2019 saw the introduction of 'Collision Management', a one-day course to replace the previous Road Risk Champion and Collision Investigator courses. Your feedback was that generally the same people attended both courses, so we amended the content whilst maintaining the learning outcomes to make the training more time-efficient for delegates. This training meets the nominated Road Risk Champion training requirement at Silver S5.

FORS developed and launched a new one-day fleet management training course, Fleet Management Essentials, specifically for managers responsible for fleets that do not require an Operator Licence, such as car and van fleets. This training was added to run alongside the existing heavy goods vehicle and passenger carrying vehicle Fleet Management Essentials for members who do hold an Operator Licence. This training meets the responsible person training requirement at Bronze M3.

#### FORS Fleet Tools – a smart new addition to FORS Online

With well over 80,000 hits per month, FORS Online, the scheme's website is a key resource for all FORS members. FORS Online has a wealth of information to help operators to attain and maintain their accreditation. In 2019 we introduced FORS Fleet Tools, a free online bank of toolkits designed to help operators to collate and manage fleet data.

The tools comprise of a fuel tracker, to help record and track fuel use, a Penalty Charge Notice (PCN) tracker to monitor, manage and help reduce PCNs, and an incident tracker to track and monitor incidents involving drivers or vehicles.



Developed in collaboration with FORS Affinity Partner FleetCheck, FORS Fleet Tools make it easier for members to manage their accreditation at Bronze, Silver or Gold, evidence and demonstrate how they meet the FORS requirements. identify areas of improvement within their fleet and monitor progress against efficiency and cost-saving goals. Already over 650 members are taking advantage of these free online tools.

#### FORS Fleet Management Software goes from strength to strength

FORS Fleet Management Software (FMS) has continued to go from strength to strength during 2019. There are now over 140 companies using FORS FMS which equates to over 4,000 vehicles. Analysis in 2019 has shown that 78 per cent of FORS FMS users pass their Bronze audit first time.

## Smarter delivery - Going for Bronze, Silver, and Gold webinars

In July, FORS launched a series of free to attend Going for Bronze live webinars.

The new online format covers topics from the original classroom workshop yet allows delegates from across the UK to attend from their own workspace.

The one-hour webinar covers all elements of the FORS Bronze accreditation process, from booking an audit all the way through to completing the audit itself.

The one-hour webinars cover the Silver and Gold application processes respectively, how to upload evidence, what the FORS compliance team check for, what the most common pitfalls are and how to avoid them. The webinar guides FORS members through the tools available to help them prepare for their application.

In addition to the Going for Bronze, Silver, and Gold webinars, FORS offers 'Introduction to FORS' and 'Demystifying FORS and CLOCS' webinars.

#### Spotlight on...

#### **Performance matters**

FORS's vision is for our members to operate in the safest, smartest and greenest way possible, with the least impact on society and the environment. FORS members have long since recognised the commercial and performance benefits of running a compliant and environmentally friendly fleet, working to standards above the legal minimum to achieve operational best practice. Implementing best practice measures brings many benefits such as an efficient and economically viable business, improved employee job satisfaction and good customer relations.

At FORS Silver, members actively monitor and benchmark operational performance data and at FORS Gold members go on to demonstrate meaningful improvements against their benchmark data. Amongst FORS Gold members there was a 12 per cent improvement in fuel usage in 2019 and a 14 per cent reduction in the amount of  $CO_2$  generated. Coupled to that, in 2019 FORS Gold members also reported a 32 per cent reduction in the number of incidents they were involved in, and a staggering 49 per cent reduction in the number of PCNs they received.

FORS places great emphasis on training drivers in safe and efficient driving techniques, and equipping fleet managers with the knowledge and skills to operate and manage safe and roadworthy vehicles. This increased awareness of best practice coupled with the implementation of the FORS Standard has undoubtedly helped FORS Gold members achieve measurable improvements in operating performance.

#### FORS Regional Members' Briefings

In 2019, FORS ran 12 Regional Members' Briefings across the country in locations which included Birmingham, Bristol, Croydon, Manchester, Leeds, Glasgow and Newcastle.

In total 291 delegates attended the briefings which ran in February, October and November.

Lasting four hours each, the February briefings covered compliance issues, implementation of version 5 of the FORS Standard and requirements of the FORS levels of accreditation. Delegates were given the opportunity to choose what accreditation levels they wished to cover in greater detail.

The later briefings also gave an update from the FORS Members' Conference which took place in October and explained the new concept of 'mixed accreditation'.

This is where an operating centre is Bronze, but it may also hold Silver

accreditation for an agreed part of its fleet at that operating centre, and must progress to become fully Silver within a five-year period.

Feedback from the briefings was generally positive and your comments will be taken on board in our future developments.

For example, you said that given the significant changes in version 5 of the FORS Standard, we should make sure that version 6 minimises impact on our members and should offer more options for alternative types of training and the use of alternative vulnerable road user safety equipment. Other recurring comments included requests to simplify the FORS website and to ensure auditor consistency.

Our 2019 delegates confirmed that these events are a useful addition to the FORS events calendar, so watch out for more dates in 2020.



FORS maintains a significant media presence in both the trade and sector press. In 2019 FORS saw an increase in activity over 2018 across several different media channels.

The number of LinkedIn followers increased by a staggering 92 per cent over the previous 12 months and there was a 50 per cent increase in the number of editorials in comparison to 2018.

# FORS Travel Plan Toolkit – making greener journey choices

In version 5 of the FORS Standard, we introduced a new requirement for Gold members to have a Workplace Travel Plan in place for their organisation. The Gold requirement 'G8 Staff travel' was introduced to encourage the promotion of sustainable staff travel behaviour and to minimise the negative impact of staff travel to and from the workplace. In order to help members meet this requirement, FORS released a Workplace Travel Plan Toolkit in January 2019.

The toolkit, comprising of a template with step-by-step guidance, takes operators through each item that must be included within their Workplace Travel Plan.

The toolkit includes a staff and visitor survey, a template to present the results, examples of objectives and targets, incentives and initiatives, and more.

## Helping members to boost their green credentials in 2019

With a fleet's environmental impact encompassing far more than just emissions, there is a lot that can be done to make road transport smarter and greener.

In 2019, FORS packaged up its environmental offer and benefits into an infographic showing how FORS helps its diverse membership base of trucks, vans, cars, passenger carrying vehicles and powered two-wheelers achieve environmental best practice. Smaller operators (those with fewer than five vehicles and fewer than five employees) still need to produce a Workplace Travel Plan, however a significantly shorter version can be submitted. This is also set out in the toolkit.



FORS progressive model means members are always seeking to do more to reduce emissions, fuel consumption and lessen their environmental impact, as they move from entry level FORS Bronze up to FORS Silver and FORS Gold.

## FORS Fuel Expert – go green and stay in control

Early in 2019, FORS launched FORS Fuel Expert (FFE) in partnership with FORS Affinity Partner, Fuel Card Services (FCS), offering members access to up to 16 different fuel cards from a range of major brands. The scheme offers members the chance to save up to four pence per litre (ppl) off the national average pump price and up to 10ppl off motorway pump prices, along with the chance to reduce overall fuel consumption. Since the launch over nine million litres of fuel have been purchased.

Controlling and reducing emissions and helping improve the environmental credentials of our members is a key FORS principle. The inclusion of FORS Fuel Reporting in FFE means members can access robust fuel consumption and MPG reports, helping to lower their emissions by better understanding their fuel use. This helps members achieve emission reduction goals, a key requirement at FORS Silver, and a guiding principal throughout FORS Standard version 5.

FORS Fuel Reporting also includes CO<sub>2</sub> Count Certificates, which offer statistics on greenhouse gases generated by a company's vehicles. For every CO<sub>2</sub> Count

## Local Authorities are using FORS to meet the Green Challenge

With local authorities now responsible for meeting tough air quality targets, with Clean Air Zones and Low Emission Zones in place in many cities, the need for cleaner and efficient road transport has never been greater.

As part of its remit to drive up standards across road transport nationally, FORS has been working closely with local authorities and service providers to help reduce the emissions of all commercial

vehicles. FORS progressive accreditation is now being built into local authority service contracts, giving local authorities a clear standard which all commercial vehicles operating on its behalf must meet. This ensures road transport supply chains are operating as efficiently and safely as possible.

Version 5 of the FORS Standard implemented in January 2019 offers the 'greenest' set of requirements yet.

#### Spotlight on...

#### How FORS works for small operators

FORS defines a 'small operator' as a company with fewer than five vehicles and fewer than five employees.

While we recommend documenting policies and risk assessments as good practice whatever your company size, we do recognise that small operators may not always have the resource needed to put together written policies. If you are a small operator, you can confirm verbally the 17 policies outlined in 'M1 FORS documentation' along with the 16 risk assessments contained in 'M8 Health and Safety'.

Where a requirement aligns to a legal obligation, operators of all sizes are required to provide documented evidence that the policy is working, they are meeting their legal obligation and the correct documentation is being kept.

Taking 'V1 Serviceability and roadworthiness' as an example, a small operator may verbally explain the policy they have in place to maintain their vehicles, trailers and specialist equipment in a roadworthy condition. To demonstrate how this policy is enacted we would expect to see evidence of a vehicle maintenance planner and individual vehicle maintenance records.

A company with less than five employees does not need to show the links between their staff in an organisation chart as outlined in 'M4 Staff resources'. They can explain how the team works verbally at the time of audit. For 'V7 Tyre management' small operators can verbally describe how they manage their tyre replacement and removal policy by producing evidence of the tyre company used and a copy of their waste carrier certificate or invoice to confirm payment for environmental disposal of used tyre casing.



The important message for all our small operators is that the written evidence that you must demonstrate to us in order to gain your Bronze accreditation, is only evidence that you are legally required to keep under the Operator Licensing regulations and Guide to Maintaining Roadworthiness.

#### Spotlight on...

#### FORS Members' Conference

Jo is chair and a trustee of the international Transaid charity, which FORS is proud to have supported through the conference.

#### Looking forward

FORS is always evolving and since 2015 the FORS Community Partnership (FCP) has served FORS well, looking after the three core elements of the scheme; governance of the Standard; administration of the scheme; and certification of operators. In 2020 this will change.

Over the course of 2019, TfL ran a series of 'industry days' to ask stakeholders how they think the scheme could be strengthened. In response to that, two main changes have been agreed that will create the 'future model' for FORS.

Firstly, to create clear separation between the governance, administration and audits, the scheme governance will be procured by TfL through a separate service contract likely to be in place by mid 2020. Whoever is successful in bidding to do the scheme governance will be responsible for GSAG, and therefore responsible for the Standard.

Secondly, to encourage more audit providers, it is intended that by 2022 audit bodies will be able to set their own fee for the audits, rather than fees being set centrally – or in other words a move to a more market-based system of audit fees, with multiple audit providers. Whilst AECOM will remain in charge of the FORS concession until at least 2022, these changes do mean that from the middle of 2020 the FCP will no longer be needed to oversee all three elements of the scheme.

We will work to ensure these changes do not impact on members or the smooth running of the scheme, and work on version 6 of the FORS Standard has already commenced. Whilst there will be some new elements introduced, our intention is to keep significant changes to a minimum, and wherever possible make compliance more straightforward. One area that will be looked at is vehicle safety equipment.

Technology is moving quickly and a GSAG working group will be considering whether the time is now right to make the current FORS requirements for blind spot minimisation more performance based, rather than specifying the different types of equipment. That is not to say throw out all your old equipment, it's about accepting the new technology in terms of what it can do rather than what it is.

Speaking of new technology, GSAG has recommended the introduction of new methods of immersive training such as augmented and virtual reality to be an alternative to the on-cycle element of the Safe Urban Driving and Van Smart driver training courses. The quality levels to be achieved and the training course approvals process have yet to be agreed, but the wheels are in motion in this exciting new era of driver training.

Look out also for a new package of manager training on drivers' hours called Time Smart – fatigue management and managing drivers' hours, with trainer packs and a toolkit of resources, which will be released shortly.

Lastly, in response to requests for more flexibility we will be introducing 'mixed accreditation'. This is where a depot may be allowed to have some, but not all its drivers and vehicles at the silver level to address the needs of a specific contract. Strict time conditions will apply, and operators must commit to move the whole depot up to the higher level of accreditation over an agreed period.
